# SAMPLE D (Test 3, Question 7: Letter to a penfriend)

Hello. How are you?

It is a problem because I think that you will have to speak with your family. Other problem is how much money do you pay for go and practice sports. Near my house I do a lot of sports but the sports that I practice very much are football, basketball and beisball but when I go to the gim I play machines for I will have a strong muscles and resistant in the legs.

If I go to the gim and after I will go to play football I finished the day very tired. One day I go to the gim and the next day I go to play sports.

With the resistant that I could have after the gim and I could be very good for the sports that I do the next day.

### **Examiner Comments**

An adequate attempt with ambitious but flawed language, e.g.: 'Near my house . . . resistant in the legs'. There is an adequate range of structures and vocabulary, e.g.: 'If I go to the gim . . .', 'muscles', 'resistant' in a quite well organised letter, with simple linking, e.g.: 'but', 'when', 'after'. However, there are a number of errors, mostly non-impeding, e.g.: 'If I go to the gim and after I will go to play football I finished the day very tired'. Some effort is required from the reader.

# SAMPLE E (Test 3, Question 7: Letter to a penfriend)

Dear Luke,

Hi. I hope you're well. I am so glad to hear from you. It's nice to know that you go to the gym regularly. I believe it will make you fit. I can't wait to see the result of your exercise. Well, near my house there are four tennis courts which open every day at nine in the morning and close at ten in the evening. It costs \$10.00 for two hours. There is also a basketball court and two football fields but I have no idea how much the rent is. I heard that there is also a swimming pool being renovated at the moment right beside the tennis courts. On Saturdays, I play badminton with my cousin for about an hour, after that I get really tired. Sometimes I like to play football but unfortunately, most members of the teams are boys so it's enough for me to just watch them play. Perhaps I will go swimming as well when the pool is finished. Hope you will write again soon. Take care.

## **Examiner Comments**

This is a very good attempt with a wide range of structures, e.g.: 'I heard that there is also a swimming pool being renovated at the moment right beside the tennis courts', and vocabulary, e.g.: 'I can't wait to see the result'. The narrative is well organised with simple linking, e.g.: 'On Saturdays', 'sometimes'. There is a natural flow to the letter, e.g.: 'Well, near my house . . .' and errors are very minor; word choice only, i.e. 'unfortunately' and 'rent'. No effort is required from the reader.

# SAMPLE F (Test 3, Question 7: Letter to a penfriend)

I have been next in my house 6pm.

Playing tennis and exercice. I like going to the beach very nice in my country is beautiful places and restaurants, museum, show the sings and very nice academic sports and exercice aerobic, music. But I like playing football. I like my brother participle in the playing football in very fast, next my house in Putney.

### **Examiner Comments**

This is a poor effort showing a restricted command of language with little evidence of basic sentence structure, e.g.: 'show the sings . . . aerobic, music'. However, occasional phrases do make sense, e.g.: 'I like going to . . .', 'I like playing . . .'. There are numerous errors which lead to incoherence, e.g.: 'But I like playing football . . . my house in Putney'. The text requires excessive effort from the reader.

# SAMPLE G (Test 3, Question 8: The lost birthday present)

Jane was excited because next day was going to be her birthday! She was so happy because their parents bought her a piano and she love play it. They hide it under the stairs, and they said to Jane that she can't open it until her birthday. She couldn't wait so she dicided to go the night before her birthday and play it. When she opened the door of the room where the piano was she saw that it wasn't there. She was so worried so she went to bed again. Next day when she woke up she saw the piano in her room, and her mom was near it. She told Jane that she moved the piano because she knew she was going to play it. Ouf!

#### **Examiner Comments**

This is a good attempt with a fairly ambitious use of language. There is a more than adequate range of structures and vocabulary, e.g.: 'When she opened the door of the room where the piano was she saw that it wasn't there' with some evidence of organisation and some linking of sentences. There are some errors, mainly in tenses, e.g.: '. . . she love play it. They hide it under the stairs' but, on the whole, only a little effort is required from the reader.

## **Examiner Comments**

This is an inadequate attempt which starts with some ambition (e.g.: 'I just want to tell you . . . last saturday') but rapidly becomes incoherent (e.g.: 'Finally we are found . . .'). The text appears to follow a narrative sequence but is difficult to understand due to language errors, which are numerous and sometimes impede. Considerable effort is required from the reader.

Last month, it was my mother's birthday. My brother, my dad and I prepared an amazing party with all her friends. It was hard to organise but we did it . . . Dad told me I was in charge of the present which was a new digital camera. I put it in my room, under my pillow, thought it was a safety place . . .

On the day, when my dad asked me to go and get the present, I couldn't find it! Mum was waiting, all her friends were too . . . They were all looking at me with this horrible look which means 'You've done something wrong'.

After a while, mum started laughing, we didn't understand why . . . she said: 'Is the present a digital camera?!' My brother replied 'Yes, it is! How do you know?' She laughed more and more and declared that she found it in my room and she had started already to use it!

We were all laughing and smiling, glad about this revelation.

### **Examiner Comments**

This is a very good attempt with a confident and ambitious use of language, e.g.: 'Dad told me I was in charge of the present which was a new digital camera'. There is a wide range of structures and vocabulary, e.g.: 'She laughed more and more and declared that . . .', '. . . glad about this revelation' and the narrative is well organised with effective use of linking devices, e.g.: 'On the day . . .', 'After a while . . .'. There are a few minor errors which do not impede, e.g.: 'a safety place' and no effort is required from the reader.

Girl: Well, I suppose the biscuits would be nice with ice cream. Let's see . . . oh, good. I've got enough money in my purse.

Three. Which T-shirt does the woman buy?

Woman: I'd like to buy a white T-shirt with short sleeves, please. Large size.

Man: I'm afraid the white ones have long sleeves, but we've got short sleeves in the darker colours. Do you want a round neck or a V-neck?

Woman: It must be round neck. Let me think . . . umm, OK, I'll take one of the short-sleeved ones – the colour's not so important really.

Man: Have you packed for your holiday?

Man: I always take a big sports bag – it's light, and not expensive, so it doesn't matter if it gets torn.

Woman: Yes, I thought about one of those, but you need something stronger when it's going on a plane. I'll get something I can put on my back – you can carry more that way.

Woman: OK everybody. This next exercise is a bit difficult, but it's really good for your legs. Now put your hands out straight in front of you . . . right . . . make sure your head is against the wall. Now, see how long you can stay like that! If you do two minutes, you're doing well.

Woman: When our daughters were five, my husband suggested using the dolls to entertain the children at their birthday party. I wrote a little show and he built a dolls' theatre. My daughters and their friends loved it. As a result, other parents asked me to come and do the show at their children's parties. That's how it all began.

Man: It must be a lot of work for you?

Woman: Yes. I love making the dolls, but I decided that I needed someone to help me with the shows. Luckily my neighbour, Lena, was keen to perform with me. Her husband records the music to go with the shows. It would be impossible to do everything on my own.

Man: Have you ever had any problems?

Woman: Only once. I did a show for a group of three-year-olds, and I'd written a story about a lion. Unfortunately, the children were really afraid of the lion and started crying. I was worried the parents might complain, but luckily they were all able to laugh about it afterwards.

Man: And what did you learn from that?

Woman: The experience taught me that I had to find out beforehand just what children enjoy.

Like me, Lena has two daughters, so whenever we've invented a new story, we show it to our four girls first. They always tell us exactly what they think of it. And sometimes I take new dolls to the local primary school to check that children like them.

Man: And the shows continue to be successful?

Woman: They do. I have a range of different shows for five to nine-year-olds. In fact, the shows have become so successful I could do one every day, but I don't want to do that. The reason the shows have become popular, I think, is because I love every minute of every show, and so other people love them too. I certainly didn't realise when I organised that birthday party for my daughters all those years ago that it would change my life so much!
